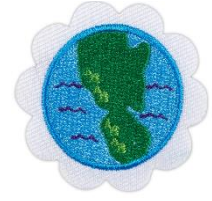




Life Skills • Daisy **Badge Blueprint**



Good Neighbor Badge

Purpose of Petal: When a Girl Scout earns this petal, she will have learned about the communities she belongs to and how the people in these communities work together to be good neighbors to each other.

Supplies needed: Paper, drawing supplies (markers, crayons, etc.)

Step 1: Learn about your communities.

Discover the different communities that each Girl Scout belongs to. Talk about these communities, the people in them, and how these people work together within the community (communities include school, family, Girl Scouts, towns, neighborhoods, states, etc.)

Step 2: Draw your community.

Choose one community that you belong to and draw it on a piece of paper. Get creative! Make sure to mark important places in the community. Girls can draw a picture of their town and mark places like their school, the hospital, government buildings, etc. Girls can also draw the Girls Scouts Heart of Central California and mark the STEM centers, Camps, Girl Scout Huts, and locations of favorite activities. Girls can draw a picture of their state and mark the capitol, national parks, and other important places. Share your drawing with your troop, friends, and/or family.

Step 3: Practice being a good neighbor.

Think of a few different ways to show you can work together with other members in your community (at home, in your neighborhood, and in other communities you belong to). Pick one you can do today, and then do it!
